An Accolade of Torah!

Today's Parashat is Pekudei: "21These are (eleh) the accounts (Pikudei) of the Tabernacle of the Testimony (hamishkan mishkan haedut)..." (Ex. 38:21). The Hebrew word (יבּקוֹדי) (Pekudei) can also be pronounced (Pikudei) and it also appears in Psalm 19:8 — which is an accolade of the Torah of Adonai (Torat Adonai) {See my May 4, 2024 message: What is Written in the Heart}.. Notice the Hebrew pun in Ex. 28:21: (hamishkan mishkan haedut) literally, The Mishkan, a Mishkan of the Testimony. The eulogy begins in Psalm 19:7: "The Torah of Adonai is perfect.". Perfection is a catchy word and a common word included in the slogans of many businesses (e.g., Perfection Auto Repair in Gainesville). The Hebrew Word for perfect is Temimah (מבּמִימִה), which means: whole, flawless, unblemished, perfect, honest, upright, ingenuous, artless, guileless, simpleminded, cherubic, naive, childlike, unsophisticated. We in Kol Simcha, keep (guard, shomer), honor, reverence and esteem Scripture, and especially His Torah.

אמת לדות (לדות יהוד) is perfect (המימה), המימה; Temimah: whole, flawless), converting the soul: the testimony (לדות), edut) of Adonai is sure (לאמנה), Ne-emanah: sure & trusted), making wise the simple.
8The statutes (ישׂרים, Pikudei) of Adonai are right (שׁרִים, Yesharim: right & honest), rejoicing the heart: the commandment (מבּירת, mitzvat) of Adonai is pure (שׁרִים, Barah Meirat: pure light), enlightening the eyes.
9The fear (מבּירת, yirat) of Adonai is clean (שׁהַּוֹה, Tehurah: clean & untainted), enduring for ever: the judgments (משׂבּפׁשׁי, mishpetei) of Adonai are true and righteous (משׁבּפׁשׁי, Emet Tzadku Yachdav: true and righteous) altogether.
10More to be desired are they than gold, yea, than much fine gold: sweeter also than honey and the honeycomb
□ (Psalm 19:7-10, KJV).

1. We keep, honor, reverence and esteem *Torah* because Abba and Yeshua tell Us To.

There are 613 *mitzvot* (commandments in the *Torah*), however, there are over 1,000 *mitzvot* in the *B'rit Chadasha*. *Yeshua* said: ^{10"}If you keep My commandments (mitzvot), you will abide in My love, just as I have kept My Father's commandments (mitzvot) and abide in His love. ¹¹These things I have spoken to you so that My joy may be in you, and your joy may be full." ¹²This is My commandment (mitzvah), that you love one another just as I have loved you. ¹³No one has greater love than this: that he lay down his life for his friends. ¹⁴You are My friends if you do what I command you' (John 15:10-12). In the previous chapter Yeshua had said: "¹⁵If you love me, you will keep my commandments...²¹He who has My commandments and keeps them is the one who loves Me. He who loves Me will be loved by My Father, and I will love him and reveal Myself to him" (John 14:15, 21). A commandment is an order and a mandate – whether to honor Shabbat, not murder, or not lie, or to honor our parents, or to eat clean food (to not eat what is not food), or to rejoice in Sukkot.

2. We keep, honor, reverence and esteem Torah because Torah gives us definition.

The *Torah* tells us how to become a child of Abraham. Many Jewish traditions are purely cultural, but the *Torah* presents a lifestyle in holiness that *transcends culture*. The *Torah* is what gives the descendants of Abraham their identity. Believing in *Yeshua* only makes that identity complete!

3. We keep, honor, reverence and esteem *Torah* because it is who we are.

We are new creations: "17Therefore if anyone is in Messiah, he is a new creation. The old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new" (2 Cor. 5:17) and "15For neither circumcision nor

uncircumcision means anything – but only (being) a new creation" (Gal. 6:15). The Word tells us we are completely made over. What is inside of us now? The answer is Ha-Torah (Yeshua). Jeremiah said: "31not like the covenant I made with their fathers in the day I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt. For they broke My covenant, though I was a husband to them." it is a declaration of Adonai. 32"But this is the covenant I will make with the house of Israel after those days"-it is a declaration of Adonai-"I will put My Torah within them. Yes, I will write it on their heart. I will be their God and they will be My people. 33No longer will each teach his neighbor or each his brother, saying: 'Know Adonai,' for they will all know Me, from the least of them to the greatest." it is a declaration of Adonai. "For I will forgive their iniquity, their sin I will remember no more" (Jer. 31:31-33). Consider the Scripture: "14For when Gentiles, who do not have the Torah, do by nature the things of the Torah, they are a law to themselves even though they do not have the Torah. ¹⁵They show that the work of the Torah is written in their hearts, their conscience bearing witness and their thoughts switching between accusing or defending them" (Ro. 2:14-15) and this passage from Hebrews, which quotes Jer. 31:31-33: "10For this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says Adonai. I will put My Torah into their mind, and upon their hearts I will write it. And I will be their God, and they shall be My people. ¹¹And no more will they teach, each one his fellow citizen and each one his brother, saying, 'Know Adonai,' because all will know Me, from the least of them to the greatest. 12For I will be merciful toward their iniquities, and their sins I will remember no more" (He. 8:10-12). Since the Torah is written in our hearts, the *Torah* is part of our *basic makeup* as believers in Yeshua. New creations should do what comes naturally to them – keep the *Torah* that is inscribed in their heart.

4. We keep, honor, reverence and esteem *Torah* because this is *the Scriptural Mirror*.

Yaakov (James) said we needed to look ourselves in the mirror and see ourselves through the *Torah*: "22But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deluding yourselves. 23For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man who looks at his natural face in a mirror — 24for once he looks at himself and goes away, he immediately forgets what sort of person he was. 25But the one who looks intently into the perfect Torah, the Torah that gives freedom, and continues in it, not becoming a hearer who forgets but a doer who acts — he shall be blessed in what he does" (James 1:22-25). So it is the person who sees himself in the mirror — the Torah — and remembers what he looks like. It is the one that is the doer of the work the Word requires. The reflection we see in the Torah is that of ONE WHO HAS BEEN REDEEMED. It is not merely a list of DO's and DON'TS; it is literally 'Yeshua inside us, the hope of Glory.' Unless we enter in to this relationship with Ha-Torah, a whole new realm of new life in Messiah is unavailable.

5. We keep, honor, reverence and esteem *Torah* because Messiah did.

Yeshua is the Word (Torah) made flesh. Thus we should strive to be like the old hymn we used to sing in services: To Be Like Jesus, to be like Jesus, all I ask, is to be like Him Yeshua lives inside of us. How awesome is that! This is why Scripture states: "But we have this treasure in jars of clay, so that the surpassing greatness of the power may be from God and not from ourselves" (2 Cor. 47). Shabbat Shalom!
